I would like to acknowledge the ongoing commitment of our Board of Directors, and thank everyone for their extensive contributions, volunteer time and expertise they bring to this organization:

PANDEMIC, have continued to work so hard and show incredible dedication and passion to meet the needs of Niagara's community and BIAN's members. When the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a Pandemic on March 11, 2020, not-for-profit organizations had to determine quickly what to do, and plan for both short-and-long-term changes. Since this time, our staff have done an amazing job pivoting to virtual meetings, staying connected with members, coming up with creative activities (virtual horticultural groups, bingo, music, art, and trivia

to name a few), and ensuring we are providing the best support possible to BIAN members. This is not the same as seeing each other at the Clubhouse face-to-face, and some members don't have access or the ability to use technology, but staff have gone above and beyond to reach out to members to ensure they are OK and engaged during such a difficult time.

I would like to thank Judy Calvin for providing excellent leadership and support to staff and members, despite so much uncertainty, as well as invaluable expertise with grant writing, contributing to our funding that keeps us afloat. Thank you, Pat Dracup, for your long-standing commitment to BIAN, leading groups, organizing activities, and being a constant reliable source of support to members, which was especially important in 2020. Thank you Meka Matthews and Sarah Forrest for bringing creative, and innovative ideas to BIAN using virtual technology, and ensuring members were top of mind and supported throughout 2020. Thank you, Cindy Clark, for providing excellent administrative support and wearing so many hats, including preparing financial reports and being our OBIA Peer Support Mentor. Thank you to the entire staff for your amazing teamwork, passion, and resiliency during such a difficult year!

Putting the pandemic and its' associated challenges aside, in 2020, the Board staff and members pushed forward with a focus on our Mission, Vision and Values! My vision as Board Chair continued to be to improve BIAN's visibility in the community with increased marketing and social media presence, to revitalize our education initiatives and to have an excellent Board-Staff relationship working towards common goals including: bringing our talents, expertise and efforts together, providing community leadership, advocacy and education about concussion and brain injury, offering strategies for brain injury prevention and management and supporting as many people as possible in Niagara living with a brain injury, including their family and caregivers.

Due to the Pandemic, the Board made the difficult decision to pause all fundraising in 2020. While disappointing, it was the best decision as our sponsors and individuals who typically attend BIAN's fundraising events were not likely in a financial position to support. However, we were grateful to receive not-for-profit pandemic government funding which helped offset the lack of fundraising revenue.

In 2020, the Board's Personnel, OAC and Marketing and Education Committees made up of both Board and community volunteers, achieved the following goals:

- The Personnel Committee continued to provide Board support for staff and consultants and created a survey to obtain feedback from staff. This Committee was put on hold shortly after the start of the pandemic, as our consultant who was updating policies and job descriptions, was no longer able to assist and a Board member took a leave of absence. The Board continued to offer support to staff despite placing this Committee on hold.
- The OAC Board representative, Sherrie Bieman-Copland, attended OAC meetings virtually and brought valuable information back to Board meetings. It was helpful to hear what other organizations were doing during the pandemic, collaborate and learn from each other.
- The Marketing and Social Media Committee excelled with Chelsey Skrebiec's leadership and guidance. Chelsey jumped in with both feet and developed a strategy with timelines, including the use of Constant Contact for email announcements and a calendar for social media posts to raise awareness about BIAN.
- The Education Committee is still being developed, but concussion seminars were offered virtually, and the

Committee worked with Chelsey to provide brain injury awareness information and facts on social media.

I want to thank each Board member for their leadership hard work and ongoing commitment to achieving the best outcomes for BIAN. Our efforts together with staff and BIAN members makes a tremendous impact.

#### Brain Injury Association of Niagara Treasurer's Report for the Period January 1 - December 31, 2020

2020 was a different year for all of us including BIAN. The Clubhouse, groups, and activities continued in a different capacity as a result of Covid-19. We have been successful in completing another year of the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

The net result is a revenue over expenditures of \$38,019.

As at December 31, 2020, BIAN's cash position is \$18,965 a decrease compared to 2019 of \$60,497.

Head for the Hills was not held in 2020 due to Covid-19. Revenues from Head for the Hills in the previous year was \$24,509.

Food for Thought was not held in 2020 due to Covid-19. Revenues from Food for Thought in the previous year was \$28,309.

Bingo Revenues (St. Catharines) were down in 2020 to \$11,466 from \$19,076 in 2019. Bingo revenues (Niagara Falls) were up slightly in 2020 to \$6,744 from \$6,531 in 2019. The Audited Statement is available on the BIAN website.

# Brain Injury Association of Niagara Advocacy, Education and Community Coordinator's Report for the Period January 1 to December 31, 2020

The year 2020 marked our 34<sup>th</sup> anniversary, as we reflect on, and celebrate our accomplishments. Thank you to all of our team players: board members, volunteers, participants, families, sponsors, and community partners, along with BIAN office manager, Judy Calvin, for your valued contribution in helping the Association adapt to new challenges as we continue to evolve, and to Meka Matthews, Clubhouse Co-ordinator, Sarah Forrest, Clubhouse Assistant, and Cindy Clark, Administrative Assistant.

#### **Advocacy**

BIAN staff continues to develop a strong presence in our community with respect to advocacy on behalf of our members and their families; advocating on behalf of clients with medical specialists; contacting emergency medical services on behalf clients in crisis; ensuring client(s) follow up with family doctor(s) for medical appointments and related tests; referring individuals for consult with respect to post-concussion symptoms, and/or linking individuals with brain injury with various other medical, legal resources, and/or related agencies, etc.

#### Recreational

Unfortunately, the YMCA of Fort Erie ceased operations in February, 2020, and subsequently, is currently operated under a partnership involving the Town of Fort Erie and the Boys and Girls Club of Niagara. During this timeframe, individuals who were accessing the YMCA in Fort Erie were able to access one of the other YMCA venues in Niagara, on a contingency basis as non-members of BIAN.

This YMCA recreational program had proven to be a tremendous support for our members in promoting inclusion in our community and facilitating members rehabilitation post injury. However, the YMCA locations in Niagara Falls, Welland, St. Catharines, Port Colborne and Grimsby were shut down mid-March, 2020 due to Covid -19. Subsequently, 3 of the 5 YMCA's re-opened September 30, 2020, (Port Colborne, Grimsby and St. Catharines) with a phased reactivation approach in order to evaluate their processes and procedures to ensure new safety practices were implemented, along with cleaning and disinfection procedures.

Shortly thereafter, the Niagara Centre YMCA (Welland) reopened for a brief period of time, prior to the Provincial mandated lockdown on December 27, 2020. The Niagara Falls (McBain Centre) YMCA did not reopen in 2020, and permanently closed in January of 2021. Furthermore, in March, 2021 it was announced that the Walker Family YMCA building would be put up for sale, due to the impact of the Covid pandemic, and also, attributed to the declining membership, which made maintaining the large facility no longer economically sustainable.

Throughout the year, participants have enjoyed the monthly therapeutic horticultural sessions that incorporated seasonal themes with Ginelle Bucher, horticultural therapist. Members who have participated in the craft activities with Ginelle have enjoyed these sessions. Participants have adapted well to the Zoom platform for these sessions.

Members have also participated in monthly painting sessions with Deborah Haig via Zoom and have enjoyed painting and exploring different techniques to create their masterpieces. All participants are looking forward to when the Oasis Clubhouse reopens as they miss the personal connection and interaction with their peers.

#### **Annual Events**

Due to the Covid pandemic in March, 2020 the annual "Head for the Hills" Race/Corporate Challenge event held on an annual basis in conjunction with the St. Catharines Road Runners and Walkers was cancelled. The Food for Though Gala was also cancelled due to the pandemic.

#### **BIAN's Annual Picnic**

Our annual picnic in the park held at Queenston Heights, in Niagara-on-the-Lake, was also cancelled due to the pandemic and provincial lockdown. BIAN's seasonal Christmas Party, and other special event outings, were also cancelled due to the provincial lockdown.

#### **Facilitated Groups**

#### Monthly Concussion Seminars and New Concussion Peer Group

Thanks to funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation, monthly concussion seminars, facilitated by Sean Robb continued in 2020 via zoom on a monthly basis. The Concussion Peer Group, targeted for individuals who had sustained brain injury within the past 3 years, was facilitated by Dr. Sherrie Bieman-Copland. Facilitation of the in-person Peer Groups were also impacted as a result of covid, and a trial period of Zoom meetings were implemented. However, the participants' preference for continuation of in-person meetings necessitated the postponement of the meetings due to the ongoing status of the pandemic.

#### Women's Group Acquired Brain Injury Facilitated Meetings

Monthly meetings were facilitated by Dr. Michelle Lohnes at her office location in Beamsville. The preference for in-person meetings by the participants, as opposed to Zoom based portal, due to the covid pandemic, resulted in Dr. Lohnes connecting with the participants informally on an individual basis.

#### **Guest Speakers**

Pauline Thivierge, Case Manager with CMHA for Brant-Haldimand-Norfolk presented an interactive Zoom workshop to our members on the topic of *Grief and Loss during the Covid-19 Pandemic* in June, 2020, thanks to funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

In July, Pauline Thivierge also presented a zoom presentation for our participants on the topic of *Anxiety and Traumatic Brain Injury*, which was well received by the members, thanks to funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

In July of 2020 we were privileged to have Joanne Smith, BA, BRT Dip., C.N.P, a certified Nutritional Practitioner who specializes in working with individuals with neurological conditions such as spinal cord and brain injuries, as our guest speaker. She presented on the topic of *Nutrition and Brain Injury*, thanks to funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

In conclusion, BIAN staff is dedicated to maximizing the quality of life for individuals and families coping with the life-long effects of brain injury, and we will strive to enhance our level of programs and services, taking into consideration the challenges presented due to the Covid pandemic and adaptation to programs and support groups via the zoom platform.

BIAN staff would like to extend our thanks and appreciation to our Board of Directors, and our network of corporate and community volunteers, along with our BIAN participants and their families for their continued dedication and support.

# Brain Injury Association of Niagara Report from the Peer Support Co-ordinator for the Period January 1 to December 31, 2020

OBIA's Provincial Peer Support Program (PSC) connects persons with lived experience (the Mentor) with an individual who is living with the effects of an acquired brain injury who requires the support (the Partner). The program is available to survivors, family members and/or unpaid caregivers FREE OF CHARGE.

Throughout 2020, there were 6 Mentors last year, and 12 Partners, with 10 matches based on a one-year term commitment. The main source of referrals continues to be generated through BIAN's application process, and also during initial phone inquiries regarding BIAN's programs. New or returning members can check off their interest in the program, at which time they will be contacted for an intake process. More information is also accessible on our website: www.bianiagara.org.

Recruitment for Niagara's Peer Support Program is required in order to ensure success of the program, and this year has been especially challenging as a result of the COVID pandemic. Province-wide, each Peer Support Coordinator shared what were some of the unique strategies implemented in order to recruit new Mentors/Partners. It was interesting to see all the different ways to recruit. As partnerships come to an end, BIAN is interested in new mentors who are willing to take part in the program, and also, partners who feel as though they can benefit from a 'knowledgeable friend.' As Peer Support Coordinator, it is my privilege to be involved in this Peer Support Program, as I continue to strive to create successful matches that will be mutually beneficial for both the Mentor and the Partner.

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#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

#### To the Members of the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA

#### **Qualified Opinion**

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA, which comprise the financial position as at December 31, 2020, and the statements of operations and changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In my opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA as at December 31, 2020 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

In common with many non-for-profit organizations, the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA derives part of its revenue from donations, fundraising events, lottery, book sales and memberships the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and I was not able to determine whether, as at and for the years ended December 31, 2020 and December 31, 2019, any adjustments might be necessary to revenue, excess of revenue over expenditures, assets and net assets. This caused me to qualify my audit opinion on the financial statements as at and for the year ended December 31, 2019.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA in accordance with ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified audit opinion.

### Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA's financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements (con'd)

- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF NIAGARA to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and the significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during the audit.

#### 1. Purpose of the Organization

The Brain Injury Association of Niagara is a registered non-profit charity. The mandate of the charity is to provide a variety of services to brain injured survivors and their families including support, advocacy, information and referrals to other agencies and professionals. The agency also works in schools and in the community on prevention programs and promotion of awareness of the impact of brain injuries. The organization is registered as a charitable organization and is exempt from income tax legislation under subsection 149(1)(f) of the Income Tax Act.

Brain Injury Association of Niagara exercises significant influence over an organization called "Friends Helping Friends". Friends Helping Friends is a registered non-profit charity whose mandate is to provide support for individuals with a brain injury. Brian Injury Association of Niagara exercises significant influence over Friends Helping Friends' operating, financing, and policy-making activities through its representation on the Board of Directors of the organization and interchange of managerial personnel. Friends Helping Friends' assets, liabilities and net assets are not included in these financial statements.

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO) and include the following significant accounting policies:

#### (a) Revenue recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Fundraising and conference revenue are recognized when the events are held. Interest income is recognized as it is earned.

#### (b) Cash and cash equivalents

The organization's policy is to present bank balances under cash and cash equivalents.

#### (c) Capital expenditures

Capital expenditures are expensed in the year of acquisition.

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (con'd)

#### (d) Contributed services

Because of the difficulty in determining the fair market value of all contributed services, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

#### (e) Financial instruments

#### Measurement

The organization initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value.

The organization subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at cost or amortized cost, except for investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the statement of operations.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, accounts receivable and HST recoverable.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities and employee deductions payable.

For financial assets subsequently measured at cost or amortized cost, the organization regularly assesses whether there are any indications of impairment. If there is an indication of impairment, and the organization determines that there is a significant adverse change in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows from the financial asset, it recognizes an impairment loss in the statement of operations. Any reversals of previously recognized impairment losses are recognized in operations in the year the reversal occurs.

#### (f) Use of estimates

The preparation of the organization's financial statement in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from such estimates.

#### 3. Friends Helping Friends

During the year, an amount of \$10,865 (2019 - \$16,281) was transferred from Friends Helping Friends to the organization to be used for direct programming expenditures.

#### 4. Deferred Grant - Ontario Trillium Foundation - Grow Grant

In the prior year, the organization was approved for a grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation in the amount of \$455,200. The grant is over a 36 month period and is to be used to expand the community support model for people with an acquired brain injury in the Niagara Region. The unexpended monies at the end of this fiscal year have been deferred and will be realized as revenue when expended.

#### 5. Agreement

The organization is party to a written agreement with the Ontario Brain Injury Association (OBIA). This agreement provides for, amongst other things, the opportunity for the community associations along with OBIA to work co-operatively to develop and deliver province-wide programs, projects and activities for people living with the effects of acquired brain injury. Each organization remains an independent community association.

#### 6. Commitments

On March 1, 2019, the organization entered into a new lease agreement that requires monthly payments of \$3,400 + HST and expires February 28, 2024.

#### 7. Impact of Coronavirus COVID-19 Pandemic

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared the Coronavirus COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic. This has resulted in significant financial, market and societal impacts in Canada and around the World.

The pandemic led to the cancellation of all fundraising events during the year. In order to assist with the decrease in revenue, the organization has claimed the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS) for which the Government of Canada provides a subsidy of up to 75% of employees wages. As well, as the Canada Emergency Rent Subsidy (CERS) for which the government provides a subsidy of up to 75% of rent.

The duration and magnitude of the pandemic's impact on the organization's operations and financial position is not known at this time. These factors present uncertainty over future cash flows, may cause significant changes to the assets or liabilities and may have a significant impact on future operations. An estimate of the financial effect is not practicable at this time.

#### 8. Financial Instruments

The organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments.

Credit risk

For accounts receivable, the organization assesses, on a continuous basis, amounts receivable on the basis of amounts it is virtually certain to receive based on their estimated realizable value.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk of being unable to meet cash requirement obligations as they come due. The organization manages its liquidity risk by constantly monitoring forecasted and actual cash flows and financial liability maturities, and by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash.
